SAVHS Knowledge Bowl Team State Champions

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For the third time in four years, the St. Anthony Village High School Knowledge Bowl team swept the field and returned home State Champions in the "AA" Division. Across the state, 769 teams compete all year for the honor of being invited to participate in the 48-team field. Unlike Minnesota State High School League events, our high school is classified as a "large school" attributable only to its location in the Twin Cities Metro region, and our students consistently compete against the largest public high schools and private schools in the state. "An onlooker would never suspect that St. Anthony is the smallest team in the field," says Michael Pristash who is in his sixth year as coach. "The way our kids handle themselves and the pressure of competition is first-class; they're truly polished, spirited competitors. We spend all season (September-April) practicing and attending

invitationals, all of this for the opportunity to represent SAVHS at the State Tournament. To have the kids see the fruits of their labors each year has been the most rewarding facet of coaching. And any time we get to vanquish our friendly foes Chaska, St. Thomas Academy, and Eden Prairie . . . well, that's simply a good day."

Students returning home with the first-place trophy include Team Captain & Senior James Benhardus, Junior Joe Hartmann and Sophomores Antonio Backman, Madeline Severtson, and Eli-Wilken-Resman. With four returning starters and an accomplished "fierce crop of eighth graders" coming into the program next year, Pristash has high hopes for the future. "It's a testament to the caliber of instruction that takes place at all levels in that I consistently have such academically-gifted and motivated students," Pristash beams.

National History Day Winners

The mission of National History Day is to provide students with opportunities to learn historical content and develop research, hone thinking and communication skills through the study of history, and provide educators with resources and training to enhance classroom teaching. National History Day is a highly regarded academic organization for elementary and secondary school students. For more than 25 years the National History Day organization has promoted systemic educational reform related to the teaching and learning of history in America's schools.

Each year, more than half a million students (encouraged by thousands of teachers nationwide) participate in the NHD contest. Students choose historical topics related to a theme and conduct extensive primary and secondary research through libraries, archives, museums, oral history interviews, and historic sites. After analyzing and interpreting their sources and drawing conclusions about their topics' significance in history, students present their work in original papers, exhibits, performances and documentaries. St. Anthony Middle School 7th and 8th grade students all created a project for competition at the local level. Many students moved into the regional competition with their excellent displays. Seven students furthered their competition onto the state level. Two SAMS students (of the 28 projects from Minnesota) have the honor of representing the state and the school at the national competition in the University of Maryland on June 10 to 14. Brynna Wilken-Resman took a 1st place in her presentation on Tokyo Rose in the individual performance competition while Jared Burseth placed 2nd with his research paper on the sovereignty and statehood of Hawaii. Spanish Classes go to Spain

In April, 34 Spanish students had the opportunity to travel to Spain, spending six days touring the country and six days with a host family. The goal of the trip was to learn more of the language and more about the history, culture, and geography of the country.

The tour started in Madrid where they visited the Grand Plaza, the Prado Art Museum, the Reina Sofia Museum of Modern Art, the National Palace, and walked through the Retiro Park. The next day included a visit to a palace called El Escorial in San Lorenzo where the highlight was seeing the catacomb of Spanish kings and queens, and a walking tour of Segovia which is famous for what remains of the Roman aqueducts. The itinerary also included the cities of Granada and Sevilla to view Moorish palaces of the Alhambra, a flamenco dance spectacular, and the cathedral in Sevilla,



noteworthy for being the third largest in the world and the resting place of Christopher Columbus.

The end of the tour brought the beginning of the family stay in the Talavera area, something which made students nervous because they were going to be alone with the families for six days. The families met the students with hugs and kisses, as is their custom, and one could see the nerves began to melt away. At the end of the family stay, many students were sad to part ways. In those days they learned much about the language and culture of Spain. A common sentiment is that the family stay was the best part of the trip, something they were afraid of before it began.

The students who participated were well-mannered and respectful of the Spanish people. They carried themselves well and were good ambassadors of St. Anthony Village High School, Minnesota, and the United States.
